

Students were also given the opportunity to have a swim in the natural geothermal lake the Secret Lagoon, where students were able to enjoy the natural 40 degrees water temperature. 



As a school, ensuring that every one of our pupils can become the person God intended them is our vision and, as a department, we are continuing to strive to remove as many barriers as possible for every pupil in our care.

There's a special prize for any students that manage to find Diglett or Mewtwo! Keep searching, complete your quest, and see if you can catch them all!


Musician of the Week



Year 11: This is the week... to prepare

There are 7 teaching weeks until the GCSE exams start, 7 weeks to make the most of every opportunity to prepare well for the exams. All year 11 have now been given a revision pack including flash cards and a revision planner and departments are preparing a revision schedule to enable all students to reach their potential. To ensure students have extra exam practice we have re focused the weekly assembly, tutor time and PSHE lessons.

Monday

The Year 11 assembly will focus on 'this is the week to practise exam techniques for 'specific subject'. They will be facilitated by Mrs Robinson but delivered by a core Head of Department. Students will be told this is the week for 'specific subject' and the revision strategy is... (whatever the Head of Department believes is the best revision strategy for that subject)

Tue/Wed/Thur/Fri Tutor Time

Students will go directly to tutor (no line up) and the head of department will deliver a master class via Teams. Tutors will facilitate and support the students where necessary with the subject-specific information being delivered directly by the Head of Department.

OPTIONS FOCUS: Studying at St Bede's in Key Stage 4



GCSE History: OPTION

Studying AQA History at GCSE offers students the opportunity to explore significant historical periods that have shaped the world we live in today. The course covers a range of fascinating topics, including the Inter-war years, 1919-1939, USA, 1920-1973, Medicine and the reign of Elizabeth I.

Through the study of the interwar years, students gain insight into the political and social changes that followed World War I, leading to the rise of new ideologies and tensions leading to World War II. The USA module allows students to explore the nation's development, including its cultural, political, and economic transformation. The medicine module provides an understanding of how medical practices have evolved, highlighting the impact of key discoveries and public health developments. Finally, the study of Elizabeth I's reign offers a rich exploration of politics, religion, and the challenges she faced as one of England's most powerful monarchs.

By studying AQA History, students not only gain knowledge of the past, but also develop crucial skills like critical thinking, analysis, and the ability to construct well-supported arguments, all of which are valuable for future careers.

In the build up to our Year 9 Options deadline, we will focus on a selection of subjects each week, exploring what they offer at Key Stage 4 - including some core subjects too. As students prepare to make their choices, it's important to consider not just the content of the courses, but the skills they will acquire. We encourage our Year 9 students to think about their interests and future aspirations as they consider their options.

GCSE Music: OPTION

Bill Clinton said: "Music is about communication, creativity and cooperation. By studying music, students have the opportunity to build on these skills, enrich their lives and experience the world from a new perspective."

Studying Music is both challenging and rewarding in equal measure. During both courses, you will hone your skills in performing, composing and listening. It will provide you with a vast range of styles of music to listen to, appraise and enjoy; from pop to classical, film music to rock and much more. You are given chances to shine and set the world a blaze with performances of your favourite music while also allowing your imagination to run wild and write your own original compositions.

To study GCSE Music, you must be already having instrumental of singing lessons and be playing to a grade 2-3 standard at the beginning of year 10. We study the Eduqas GCSE syllabus. Over the two years, you will perform 4 minutes of music on your instrument and compose 2 compositions. You will sit one exam at the end of the course in Year 11.

GCSE English Literature: COMPULSORY

Pupils will read a wide range of texts. Reading includes: a Shakespeare play, a 19th century novel, post 1914 prose fiction and a modern text and pre and post-1914 poetry. Students will be able to read a wide range of classic literature fluently and with good understanding, and make connections, read in depth, critically and evaluatively, and appreciate the depth and power of the English literary heritage. They will write accurately, effectively and analytically about their reading, using Standard English as well as acquiring and use a wide vocabulary, including grammatical terminology, and other literary and linguistic terms they need to criticise and analyse what they read.



GCSE English Language: COMPULSORY

All pupils will have the opportunity to study GCSE English Language. Students will be assessed on their reading, writing and speaking and listening skills. Students will study both non-fiction and fiction texts that are engaging, have relevant contemporary themes and craft real world applicable writing tasks. Students must undertake a prepared spoken presentation on a specific topic in a formal setting, listen and respond to questions and feedback, and use spoken English effectively.

BTEC Engineering: OPTION

Our OCR Cambridge National engineering course at key stage 4 is designed to give students a practical knowledge of engineering in a wide range of contexts.

Students focus on product development and improvement employing their problem-solving initiative to evaluate and innovate.

In Engineering you will be covering topics such as:

- · Safe working in the workshop.
- Using Engineering skills to communicate your ideas.
- Computer Aided Design techniques in engineering using industry standard software.

You will:

- Be involved in both classroom and workshop environments studying theory and practice.
- Use practical skills including new and industrial machining techniques.
- Design, make and investigate engineering products and systems.

BTEC Design Technology: OPTION

When people ask 'What is design technology?' We answer with another question, 'What isn't?'

Design Technology encompasses a huge range of design areas. Design technology allows students to study the theory behind products and product evolution and a wide range of material areas and manufacturing processes that would enable students to pursue such career paths with confidence.

Students also manage their own design project based on an exam board brief, where they can respond creatively and explore modern and traditional manufacturing and design techniques.

Students who have studied Design here have gone on to study architecture, automotive design, product design, jewellery design and graphic design.

A Level English Literature

English Literature A's historicist approach to the study of literature rests upon reading texts within a shared context. Working from the belief that no text exists in isolation but is the product of the time in which it was produced, English Literature A encourages students to explore the relationships that exist between texts and the contexts within which they are written, received and understood. Studying texts within a shared context enables students to investigate and connect them, drawing out patterns of similarity and difference using a variety of reading strategies and perspectives.

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

POST-GCSE PATHWAY: Studying at our Sixth Form

A Level AQA Design Technology (Product Design)

You will investigate historical, social, cultural, environmental and economic influences on design and technology, whilst enjoying opportunities to put their learning in to practice by producing products of your choice. Students will gain a real understanding of what it means to be a designer, alongside the knowledge and skills sought by higher education and employers.

Throughout Years 12 and 13 you are given the opportunity to design a new product based on any theme of your choice. Areas covered by the course of Product Design are intended to reflect the wide-ranging activities of professional designers and covers a wide range of materials. Written papers will be restricted to testing the core content, but other materials such as ceramics and textiles and other areas such as electronics and mechanisms can be incorporated to produce exciting coursework. The course meets the needs of students who wish to combine 3D Designing and workshop-based manufacturing.



BTEC Engineering

Introducing the new BTEC Level 3 Nationals from 2025. The BTEC Nationals will provide students with meaningful and practical learning experiences across a range of career sectors. They are made up of 4 units:

- **Unit 1: Engineering Principles**. This unit will prepare you with a secure knowledge in the mathematical side of engineering.
- **Unit 2: Engineering Applications.** This element looks to build on previous knowledge of materials and their manufacturing processes and develop them within real world contexts.
- **Unit 3: Engineering Design.** Students will create a design solution in response to an engineering design challenge by developing three-dimensional (3D) models and two-dimensional (2D) detailed drawings including the use of a computer-aided design (CAD) system and other modelling techniques.
- **Unit 4: Engineering Project**. Students apply project management principles to undertake an individual project and will develop conceptual or practical solutions to a chosen engineering problem related to a relevant engineering specialist area.

POST-GCSE PATHWAY: Studying at our Sixth Form

A Level History

Studying OCR A-Level History offers students an engaging and in-depth exploration of some of the most significant periods in history. The course covers four fascinating topics: Democracy and Dictatorships in Germany, the Later Tudors, Civil Rights in the USA, and a coursework component that allows students to carry out independent research.

In the study of Democracy and Dictatorships in Germany, students analyse the rise and fall of the Weimar Republic and the Nazi regime, understanding the social and political forces that shaped 20th-century Europe. The Later Tudors focus on the challenges faced by English monarchs like Mary I and Elizabeth I, offering insights into religion, politics, and monarchy. The Civil Rights in the USA module provides a deep understanding of the struggles and triumphs of African Americans in their fight for equality, examining key movements and leaders such as Martin Luther King Jr. The coursework element gives students the opportunity to develop independent research skills, encouraging critical thinking and analysis. OCR A-Level History equips students with valuable skills like argument construction, historical analysis, and the ability to evaluate evidenc - skills that are vital for higher education and future careers.







A Level Music

At A-level, you will study Mendelsohn fourth symphony sometimes nicknamed the 'Italian' as well music from music theatre and classical music of the 20th and 21st century. You will perform a 10-15 recital on your instrument as well as compose two pieces lasting 6 minutes. To study A-Level music, you should have studied GCSE music or have Grade 5 Theory, be having instrumental or singing lessons and playing to grade 5 standard at the start of the course.
